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VENTURA COUNTY ELECTION ADMINISTRATION PLAN

OVERVIEW

The California Voter's Choice Act (VCA) voting model provides all voters with additional opportunities to cast their ballot. Voters have the option to choose to vote at any of the Vote Centers throughout Ventura County, which are open for a minimum of eight hours for each of the 11 days of voting, compared with one day under the polling place model. These expanded hours include weekends. Voter registration services will be provided at all Vote Centers versus only one location (Ventura County Elections Division office) under the polling place model.

The Voter's Choice Act (VCA) requires counties to develop an Elections Administration Plan (EAP) along with a Voter Education and Outreach Plan. The EAP provides a brief overview of the Vote By Mail ballot process, the proposed locations of the County's Vote Centers and Vote By Mail Ballot Drop-off locations, and elections technology that will be deployed at Vote Centers. The Voter Education and Outreach Plan must inform voters on all aspects of the VCA, including Vote Centers and Vote By Mail Ballot Drop-off locations, and information specific to non-English preference voters and voters with disabilities.

This EAP incorporates the Voter Education and Outreach Plan, both of which were developed and finalized after consultation with community members and the county's Voter Accessibility Advisory Committee (VAAC) and Language Accessibility Advisory Committee (LAAC).

A 14-day comment period is provided to the public for comments on the draft EAP. Upon review of the comments, an amended EAP will be developed and posted for an additional 14-day public comment period. The final EAP will be adopted by the County Clerk-Recorder, Registrar of Voters and submitted to the Secretary of State for approval.

VOTE BY MAIL

Elections Code 4005(a)(8)(A-B); 4005(a)(10)(I)(ii)

Vote By Mail

The VCA model requires all registered voters to be mailed a ballot and a postage paid return envelope beginning no later than 29 days before each election. Voters may return their voted ballot through the mail (postage paid), at any Ballot Drop Box starting 29 days before Election Day, or at any Vote Center. If a voter forgets to sign their return VBM envelope, or if their signature on their return VBM envelope does not match their signature(s) on their voter file, they will be notified by the Elections Division to complete and return a No Signature form or No Signature Match form prior to certification of the election. Eligible ballots postmarked on or before Election Day and received in the Elections Division by the legally required date will be counted and added to the official results.

Vote Center and Ballot Drop Box locations have different hours of operations, which are published in the County Voter Information Guide, VBM insert document, and on the Elections Division's website (www.VenturaVote.org). All Vote Centers are open 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Election Day only.

Once a VBM ballot is returned to the Elections Division, the VBM ballot envelope is signature checked against the voter's signature(s) on their voter file and any supporting documents. The VBM ballot is not processed until Elections Division staff determines the signature is a match. All challenged VBM ballots undergo a multi-level review and are also reviewed by a Supervisor. If the voter has not provided their signature, or if the signature does not match, the voter will be contacted to correct the issue prior to the election certification.

Remote Accessible Vote By Mail (RAVBM)

Any voters may receive access to the online Remote Accessible Vote By Mail (RAVBM) ballot marking program through the Election Division's website by completing the online electronic application located on www.VenturaVote.org. The RAVBM voting option will be advertised as part of the voting options all voters have.

The RAVBM system allows voters to access and mark their ballot in a screen-readable format on a personal computer. The ballot can be marked using the voter's own assistive technology, and then printed. Once a voter has completed marking their ballot, they will have an option to review their choices. Once their choices are final, the voter must print out the ballot and send it in using their return envelope that was mailed to them, a replacement envelope that is available at a Vote Center, or a printable envelope template included in the RAVBM instructions. RAVBM ballots can be returned in the same manner as any VBM ballot (mail, Ballot Drop Box, or Vote Center).

Replacement Ballot Requests

BALLOT DROP-OFF BOXES

Elections Code §4005(a)(1)(A-B); §4005(a)(10)(B); §4005(a)(10)(I)(vi); §4005(a)(10)(I)(vi)(II)

The California Elections Code requires at least one Ballot Drop-off Box for every 15,000 registered voters in the County. Using the current number of registered voters, the minimum number of Ballot Drop-off Box locations is 34. These Ballot Drop-off Boxes will be available no less than 28 days before Election Day and open during regular business hours. To determine the best locations for ballot drop-off boxes, the Ventura County Elections Division uses the 15 criteria mandated by the Secretary of State (SOS) and the Elections Code to help determine the most efficient places. The criteria include:

1. Proximity to public transit
2. Proximity to communities with historically low Vote By Mail usage
3. Proximity to population centers
4. Proximity to language minority communities
5. Proximity to voters with disabilities
6. Proximity to low rates of vehicle ownership communities
7. Proximity to low-income communities
8. Proximity to communities of eligible votes that are not registered
9. Proximity to geographically isolated populations
10. Access to free parking
11. Time and distance a voter must travel to reach a location
12. The need for alternate voting methods for voters with disabilities for whom Vote By Mail ballots are not accessible
13. Traffic patterns near Vote Center and Ballot Drop-off Locations
14. The need for mobile vote centers in addition to the number of voter centers established pursuant to Election Code 4005
15. Vote Center location public or private university or college campus

To ensure voters who primarily speak a language other than English have sufficient access, drop-off boxes are marked “Official Ballot Drop Box” in all six languages: English, Spanish, Chinese, Tagalog, Vietnamese, and Gujarati.

Any voter may drop off their voted ballot at any Ballot Drop Box location during their published hours of operation. A list of confirmed Ballot Drop Box locations with hours of operation may be found on Appendix A.

VOTE CENTERS

Elections Code §4005(a)(3)(A); §4005(a)(4)(A,C-E); §4005(a)(6)(B-D) §4005(a)(10)(I)(ii); §4005(a)(10)(I)(vi)(I); §4005(a)(10)(I)(vi)(III), §4005(a)(10)(I)(vi)(VI); §4005(a)(10)(I)(vi)(IX); §4005(a)(10)(I)(vi)(X); §4005(a)(10)(I)(vi)(XI)

Vote Centers are open for 11 days and are equipped with accessible voting equipment, language assistance, and offer Conditional Voter Registration (CVR) and same day voting. Under VCA, Vote Centers are required to be open for more than the traditional polling place format of one day. Vote Centers must be operated using two early voting periods: (1) Ten days before Election Day, and including Election Day, for a total of 11 days; and (2) three days before Election Day, and including Election Day, for a total of four days. (see Appendix B) The California Elections Code sets the parameters by which a county must provide Vote Center locations for voters:

- Starting from 10 days before Election Day, up to and including the fourth day before Election Day, for a minimum of eight hours per day, at least one Vote Center for every 50,000 registered voters.
- Starting from three days before Election Day, and including Election Day, for a total of four days, for a minimum of eight hours per day, one Vote Center for every 10,000 registered voters.
- For Special Elections conducted under the VCA model, starting from ten days before Election Day, for a minimum of eight hours per day, one Vote Center per every 60,000 voters must be operated; and on Election Day, one Vote Center per every 30,000 voters must be operated from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Using the County of Ventura Elections Divisions' current number of registered voters, the minimum required number of 11-day and 4-day Vote Centers is listed in the table below:

Days before Election Day	Number of Registered Voters per Vote Center	Vote Centers Accessible to the Public
10	50,000	10
3	10,000	51

Vote Centers operate similar to polling places by allowing voters to cast their ballots in person, whether on paper or on a Ballot Marking Device which provides a disabled access unit.

To determine the best locations for Vote Centers and ballot drop-off boxes, the Ventura County Elections Division uses the 15 criteria mandated by the Secretary of State (SOS) and the Elections Code to help determine the most efficient places. This criterion is listed in the Ballot Drop-Off Boxes section.

All eligible Ventura County residents may visit any Vote Center starting 10 days before Election Day to obtain the following services:

- Vote in-person
- Use an accessible ballot marking device called ImageCast X (ICX), that includes a touchscreen, braille keypad, audio in English and Spanish, and input for use of assistive technology device such as sip and puffs (voter must provide own assistive technology) or paddles.
- Receive assistance in languages other than English
- Drop off a voted ballot
- Register to vote, or update a voter registration using the CVR

Voters who have not registered before the close of registration (15 days prior to the Election) will be able to complete a Conditional Voter Registration (CVR) at any Vote Center and cast a provisional ballot through Election Day.

Voters can visit any Ventura County Vote Center to obtain their correct ballot type. Vote Centers open at various times, but all are open a minimum of eight hours per day and all Vote Centers are open 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Election Day. A list of Vote Centers is included in Appendix B.

Ventura County Elections meets the VCA Vote Center location requirement; therefore, a Mobile Vote Center has not been implemented at this time. A Mobile Vote Center is being considered for future elections.

Vote Centers will have layout guidelines that will be used to ensure that accessible ballot marking devices and voting booths are placed in a manner that allows voters to mark their ballot privately and independently. Layouts will be adjusted to accommodate each room's size and configuration (see Appendix C).

Vote Center staff use a secured portal to access the voter file to check-in a voter. If a voter has returned a ballot, they will be unable to obtain a replacement ballot. If a ballot has not been returned, a voter may obtain a replacement ballot, which would then void any other ballot issued to that voter. Once a ballot is returned by any method, any other ballot is automatically voided.

Voting conducted at Vote Centers follows the Secretary of State's security standards, the Elections Division's security procedures, California Election Code regulations, and the California Voting System Use procedures.

All voted ballots are returned nightly to the Elections Division. All tabulation is performed at the Elections Division. There are no tabulators at any Vote Centers.

VOTING TECHNOLOGY

The County's voting technology is comprised of two main systems, voter registration and voting tabulation. These two systems are completely separated. The voting tabulation system is a closed system and does not have any connection to the Internet.

On-demand ballot printers are used to provide voters with their specific ballot type that corresponds to their voting precinct. Additionally, on-demand ballot printers minimize the purchase and printing of extra ballots that are needed to accommodate different ballot types.

Each Vote Center will be equipped with a minimum of three accessible Ballot Marking Devices (BMD), also known as the ImageCast X (ICX). The BMD can also provide an independent voting experience for some voters with disabilities. These BMD's have ADA-compliant features and accessories and are programmed with all ballot types. The system allows for visual, audio, and tactile interfaces that can be used in any voter-preferred combination to navigate and mark a ballot.

VCA voter look-up technology utilizes a combination of electronic hardware and software to ensure secure electronic communication between the Vote Centers and the County of Ventura Elections Division's Election Information Management System (EIMS). EIMS interfaces directly with the Secretary of State's office through VoteCal. VoteCal is the centralized statewide voter registration database that exchanges information with county election management systems and other state systems. This VCA technology operates on a laptop that is hardened, meaning only the County of Ventura Elections Division approved software is operable on the device.

BUDGET

§4005(a)(10)(I)(v)

The June 7, 2022 Statewide Direct Primary Election has been allocated \$261,544 for voter education and outreach, including two mailings (printing and postage). Additionally, the Elections Division will provide in-house support for the preparation of outreach materials, public presentations, and community events. This does not include resources that are available to the Elections Division at little or no cost, such as public service announcements. The department did not previously budget specifically for outreach and education. It is estimated that approximately \$45,514 was spent on outreach activities, including staff time in years with major elections.

The budget provides for the purchase of advertisements in newspapers, television, radio and social media, as well as printing and postage costs for direct mailings to registered voters.

Information about estimated short-term and long-term costs and savings from conducting elections under the VCA model compared to recent similar elections in the same jurisdiction that were not conducted under the VCA model will be provided once estimated costs have been determined.

PREVENTATIVE MEASURES

The County of Ventura Elections Division will have in place the following security measures prior to, during, and after the election (see Appendix D for more details).

VOTER EDUCATION AND OUTREACH PLAN

OVERVIEW

Ventura County Elections Division will reach out to community organizations, agencies, schools, and other groups to raise awareness of the new voting model. Public meetings will be held with community organizations and individuals that advocate on behalf of, or provide services to, individuals with disabilities and language minority communities. Ventura County Elections Division will hold multiple public education workshops in conjunction with planned community events. All public events hosted by the County will be Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessible. For a list of events see Appendix E, this list will be updated as events are scheduled.

The public meetings will be combined with a paid PSA media campaign utilizing news media, direct mail, radio, and television as part of its voter education and outreach efforts (for a list of Media Partners see Appendix G). The following social media websites will also be used:

The campaign will promote the toll-free voter assistance hotline (800-500-3555) and 711 (CA Relay Service), inform voters with disabilities on how to obtain their ballot in an accessible format, and provide multilingual services to language minority voters.

COMMUNITY PARTNERS

The Ventura County Elections Division works in partnership with community organizations, schools, veterans' groups, government agencies, and other groups to increase awareness of the Vote Center model. Election representatives are attending community events, making presentations to organizations, and training interested individuals and groups to assist with education and outreach. A list of community events can be found in Appendix E and community partners can be found in Appendix F.

Community partners may assist in various ways, such as:

- Placing flyers and handouts in offices or locations the public may frequent
- Including an article in an organizational newsletter or on a website
- By sharing accurate, non-partisan election information on social media using the hashtag #VenturaCountyVotes

- Participating in community outreach events, an updated list of outreach events is located on our website, www.VenturaVote.org
- Inviting a County of Ventura Elections Division staff member to present non-partisan election information to clients, customers, members, or residents

HIGH SCHOOLS AND HIGHER EDUCATION

County Elections staff will continue to provide local high schools and colleges with information and resources regarding registering to vote, pre-registering to vote, and VCA election model education.

INDIVIDUAL VOTER NETWORK

Outreach and education activities are not limited to organizations. Individual voters may serve as part of a support network to alert the Elections Division to barriers to voting and provide solutions to ensure widespread awareness of the Vote Center model. The Elections Division will provide an online Voter Experience Survey form on its website to receive comments about voters' experiences. Survey questions will include the use of language services and access to the Vote Center among other questions. Voters at Vote Centers will be provided the opportunity to scan a QR code which will link directly to the online voter Experience Survey form.

DIRECT VOTER CONTACTS

Two postcard mailings are planned to inform voters of the new election model, the availability of Election Division's toll-free voter assistance hotline, and the voting options, in addition to providing this information in the County Voter Information Guide (CVIG) and the Vote By Mail ballot materials (VBM). The mailings are tentatively scheduled based on the recommended dates by the Secretary of State.

- The first postcard mailing will be sent approximately 90 days before each election, informing all registered voters of the new voting model and to check their registration status.

- The second postcard mailing will be sent approximately 60 days before each election, reminding all registered voters of the new voting model and to remind voters when the Vote Centers open, options for returning their ballot, including a reminder to sign their VBM envelope, and to vote early and avoid the lines on Election Day.

All registered voters will receive an English or Spanish postcard based on the language preference listed on their voter file.

ADVISORY COMMITTEES

The Elections Division has two advisory committees that assist in the creation and implementation of the Election Administration Plan outreach and education efforts.

PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENTS & MEDIA

Public Service Announcements (PSAs) will be distributed through local television, radio, newspapers, and social media. A PSA script for TV will be distributed with the request for visuals or closed captioning for voters who are deaf or hard of hearing. A radio script will include a request to stations to post the information on their companion websites to assist in reaching those voters. For a list of potential media partners see Appendix G.

Posters, flyers, and social media graphics will be available from the County for print and online PSAs, and for government and community partners to use in their social media and newsletters. Printed PSAs will be accompanied by a request to post the announcement on any affiliated websites with audio for the blind and visually impaired.

The Elections Division will provide Spanish, Chinese, Vietnamese, Tagalog, and Gujarati language media outlets serving Ventura County with scripts for PSAs. The scripts will inform voters of the upcoming election and promote the toll-free voter assistance hotline. Artwork will also be available.

Services for Limited English Proficient Voters

In compliance with the Voting Rights Act of 1965, Ventura County translates all election materials in Spanish. In compliance with state law, the County provides language assistance and translated copies of the official ballot in Chinese, Tagalog, Vietnamese, and Gujarati.

Language Accessibility Advisory Committee (LAAC)

The LAAC is a volunteer advisory committee to the Ventura County Elections Division that meets quarterly. The mission of the LAAC is to advise and assist the County Registrar of Voters with implementation of federal and state laws relating to access to the electoral process by voters with limited English proficiency so that all persons who are eligible to vote can understand the voting process. Ventura County Elections Division will work with LAAC members and community partners to identify voters and communities with language needs. Ventura County is required to provide language assistance in accordance with state and federal laws for the following covered languages:

Tagalog (state)

Chinese (state)

Vietnamese (state)

Gujarati (state)

The Ventura County Elections Division will continue its outreach to language minority voters and will work with LAAC members and community partners to provide voters with language assistance at educational workshops. These bilingual workshops will focus on increasing awareness of voting eligibility and educating voters about changes and their voting options under the Voter's Choice Act.

Media/Advertising

The Ventura County Elections Division will solicit feedback from the LAAC to determine the appropriate media outlets to utilize to notify language minorities of their voting options under the VCA model. Press releases will be distributed to local multilingual media partners and will announce the toll-free voter assistance hotline. The toll-free hotline provides assistance in English, Spanish, and Tagalog, with the ability to connect with live translators who can provide access to over 200 languages and dialects. The Ventura County Elections Division will work with the LAAC and community partners to identify which media outlets are utilized by the county's language minorities.

Materials in Alternate Languages

All active registered voters in Ventura County will be mailed a Vote By Mail ballot beginning at least 29 days before Election Day. All official ballots and return envelopes are bilingual in English and Spanish. The County Voter Information Guide (VIG) is printed in English and in Spanish. These County VIGs also contains the Vote Center locations and the Vote By Mail Drop Box locations. In addition, Ventura County is required to provide facsimile copies of official ballots in Chinese, Tagalog, Vietnamese, and Gujarati in specific areas of the County according to California Elections Code Section 14201. All facsimile ballot copies in the required languages and ballot types will be provided to each Vote Center.

Bilingual Assistance at Vote Centers

Vote Centers which require language assistance have been identified by the California Secretary of State through U.S. Census data. Additional identification will be through the public input process, including input provided by the County's LAAC.

The Elections Division will strive to recruit at least one Spanish-speaking Election Worker for each Vote Center to provide language assistance. If a Vote Center is in or adjacent to a precinct with other language requirements, the Elections Division will attempt to recruit Election Workers fluent in that language. The accessible language ballot marking device contains ballot content and audio in English and Spanish. In addition, the county will utilize

the Secretary of State’s Telephone Interpreter Services vendor as an alternative method of language assistance that Election Workers and Elections Division staff can utilize to call in and speak with a live interpreter. Vote Center workers are asked to use the Telephone Interpreter Service Tally Sheet to track voters who come into Vote Centers and request assistance in a language other than English. This information will assist the Ventura County Elections Division in identifying language minorities.

VOTERS WITH DISABILITIES

§4005(a)(10)(l)(i)(VI)(ib); §4005(a)(10)(l)(iii)

The Elections Division is committed to working with voters with disabilities to increase accessibility in the democratic process. The Elections Division’s website provides information and resources for voters with disabilities, including details on the ICX voter assistance device, the Remote Accessible Vote By Mail (RAVBM) system, disability services available at Vote Centers, and the VAAC.

Voting Accessibility Advisory Committee (VAAC)

The VAAC is a citizen advisory committee which makes recommendations for improving access to voting and election materials and helping to identify barriers to voting.

Education Workshops

The Elections Division will hold Disability Community Workshops featuring demonstrations of the accessible ballot marking device (ICX) voting options and the RAVBM system. Workshop locations are to be determined and will be combined with an existing community event. Workshop advertising will be done on the Ventura County Elections Division’s website, social media, print (flyers and posters) and radio media, along with trusted community partners.

Media/Advertising

The Ventura County Elections Division will solicit feedback from the VAAC to determine the appropriate media outlets to utilize to notify members of the disability community of their voting options under the VCA model. Printed materials and press releases distributed throughout Ventura County will advise the voters of all accessible ballot options, including the ability to connect voters with disabilities with TTY (Text Telephone) allowing voters who are deaf, hard of hearing, or speech-impaired to use the telephone to communicate with Elections Division staff.

PSA scripts for TV will be distributed with the request for audio, visuals or closed-captioning. Printed PSAs will be accompanied by a request to post the announcement on any affiliated websites with audio for the blind and visually impaired.

Remote Accessible Vote By Mail (RAVBM)

§4005(a)(10)(I)(ii)

All counties are required to provide an accessible Vote By Mail option for voters with disabilities. The RAVBM system allows voters to download and mark their ballot privately and independently using their own assistive technology if needed. Voters then print their marked ballot and return it to the Elections Division to be counted. Voted ballots can be returned by mail, at any VBM Drop Box, any Vote Center, or the Elections Division office.

A voter with a disability may request a link to the RAVBM system by submitting an online electronic application available on VenturaVote.org under Elections Forms. As all voters receive a ballot in the mail, a voter using the RAVBM system may use the envelope they received in the mail to return their voted RAVBM ballot. They may also download an envelope template from the RAVBM system.

Vote Center Accessibility

All Vote Centers will have at least three accessible ballot marking devices (ICX) to mark their ballot independently and privately and at least one accessible voting booth for a chair or wheelchair, pens grips, and magnifying glasses. Any voter may vote on an ICX. The ICX allows the voter to choose to mark a ballot using the touch screen display, the provided audio tactile device with braille, or their own assistive technology. Key features of the ICX include:

- A touchscreen tablet that provides the option to change text size and contrast on the tablet.
- An Audio Tactile Interface (ATI) keypad with Braille.
- Headphones, and audio instructions, in English and Spanish.
- The ability for voters to use their own Paddle or Sip and Puff assistive device.
- A Privacy mask for voters with low vision to ensure their votes are kept private as they use the audio instructions.

The ICX does not tabulate or count votes. The voter must print out their selections after marking their ballot choices and place the printed ballot in the ballot box. No voter information is stored on any ballot marking device, ensuring all ballots are kept confidential and private.

ADDRESSING DISPARITIES IN PARTICIPATION

The Elections Division works with community partners to attend events and offer presentations in historically low voter turnout areas. Citizens may pick up voter registration forms at the Elections Division office, City Halls, libraries, and post offices. Citizens may also register to vote online directly at registertovote.ca.gov or access the state voter registration website through the Elections Division's website, www.VenturaVote.org.

Ventura County Elections will make a reasonable effort to address significant disparities in voter accessibility and participation by meeting with the VAAC and LAAC to discuss any issues that ensued during the election. Furthermore, all Vote Center staff will be surveyed to evaluate any disparities regarding voter accessibility and participation for voters with disabilities and limited English proficiency.

Registering to Vote

County agencies serving low-income households and individuals with disabilities provide voter registration forms to their clients. The Secretary of State provides National Voter Registration Act (NVRA) resources and training to County agencies serving low-income residents and individuals with disabilities. The County will provide additional information and training on request to coordinators and staff at agencies.

The Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) and the Secretary of State (SOS) have established a California Motor Voter Program which will automatically register any person who is qualified to vote unless that person opts out of registration. The Elections Division will also mail a registration form to citizens upon request.

Information on voting rights and elections is provided by the Elections Division to the Ventura County Sheriff's Main Jail, the Todd Road Jail, and Ventura County Youth Correctional Facility. Authorized representatives from each facility will bring completed registration forms and VBM applications to the Elections Division for processing.

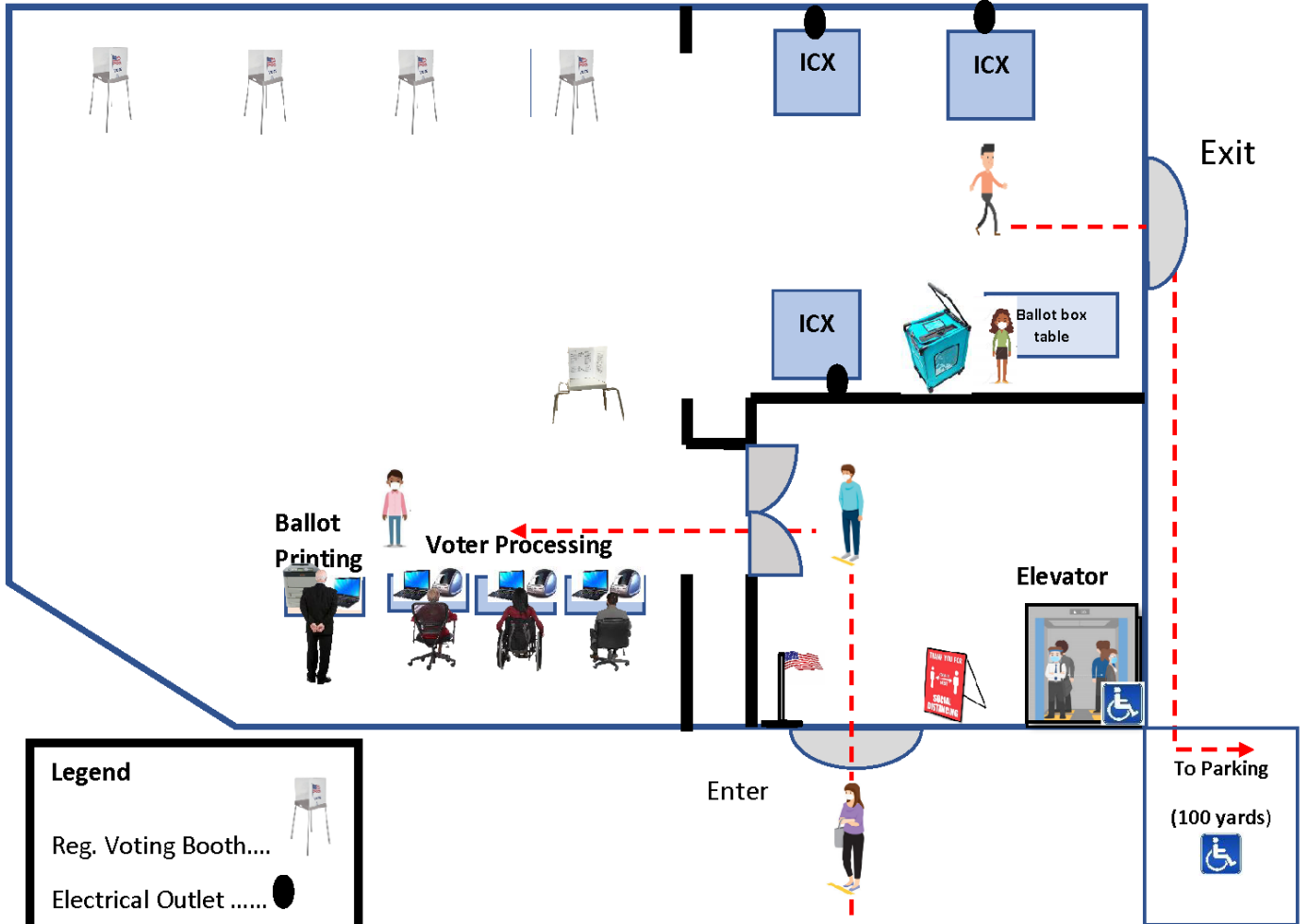

Appendix D: Preventative Measures

§4005(a)(10)(l)(vi)(VIII)(ia); §4005(a)(10)(l)(vi)(VIII)(ib)

Standardized Security Measures

- ❖ All employees are required to always carry their badge with them, the badge is how they access various parts of the Elections Division.
- ❖ Employees only have badges access to areas that are required for their work.
- ❖ Sensitive areas such as the VBM processing room, computer room and ballot storage have highly restricted access, no one is allowed to enter these rooms alone.
- ❖ All parts of the Elections Division are monitored by video surveillance.
- ❖ Visitors & observers must sign in at the front desk and wear a visitor/observer badge at all times, unless in a designated observation spot, they must be accompanied by a staff member at all times.

Suspect object or person guidelines

- ❖ Lead workers are trained to contact the police and elections staff in case of a suspicious person or object is seen at a Vote Center.

Equipment Redundancy

- ❖ Vote Center lead workers are trained to notify our office in case of any missing or non-functional equipment.
- ❖ A troubleshooting team with spare equipment will be available to sites in case of missing or non-functional equipment.
- ❖ Additional equipment can be delivered directly by elections warehouse staff.
- ❖ In case of extended equipment failure, the vote centers can function with the use of a digital roster backup file.

Vote Center Personnel Redundancy

- ❖ In case of staffing issues or shortages, the lead or if the lead is not there, the remaining staff members are trained to contact the Elections Division to acquire replacement staff as needed.

Server & Network Redundancy

- ❖ The Election Division's Election Management System (EIMS), adjudication system and vote counting system are all located on the County's secured data center.
- ❖ Regular backups are scheduled to maintain all updates and changes to voter data and the voting system itself.
- ❖ These system backups are available in case of the main server going down.

Voting Supplies Redundancy

- ❖ All vote centers will have additional supplies in case of a large number of voters.
- ❖ Backup supply containers will be with the troubleshooting team to deliver to sites as needed.
- ❖ Additional backup supply containers will be able to be delivered from the Elections Warehouse if the need arises.
- ❖ The Warehouse Supervisor will be responsible for maintaining the backup supply containers.

System Down Procedures

- ❖ In the event of an extended electrical outage the site can operate off of backup batteries to power a limited set of equipment.
- ❖ In the event of a multi-day outage backup batteries can be brought to the site from the elections warehouse to keep the equipment powered.
